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## CONTEXT AND CHALLENGE

Effective multilateral negotiations are pivotal for achieving sustainable land management combating desertification, and degradation, and drought, which are integral to achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). These negotiations aim to empower communities and nations fostering an environment conducive sustainable land management, thereby facilitating wealth creation, economic growth, and ensuring access to essential resources such as food, clean water, and energy. effective and trustworthy However, negotiators with extensive knowledge, experience, and intuition are essential for navigating the complexity of the negotiations within the United Nations Convention to Combat Desertification (UNCCD). In short becoming an effective negotiator takes time (which we are running out of) and money (a problem that perpetuates existing systemic inequities). Truly equitable and sustainable action actively involves all generations in the decision-making processes.

Initiatives exist within the UN and UNCCD scope of work to engage young people, for example the UNCCD Youth Caucus, Land Heroes campaign, The Goodwill and Land Ambassadors, Capacity Building Marketplace, Decent Jobs for Youth initiative and the Youth Engagement Strategy (decision 5/COP15).

While these initiatives are excellent to meaningfully engage youth, none of them is tailored to involve young people in decision-making processes or equip young change-makers with the skills, experience, and networks necessary to negotiate, design, and implement multilateral environmental agreements.

Within the UNCCD negotiations, several barriers impede effective youth engagement in decision-making processes. There is a lack of specific mandates enabling young people to effectively participate in the negotiation process. Meaningful involvement requires youth to engage as negotiators and active agents within institutionalised decision-making frameworks, which are currently absent.

Additionally, limited engagement with national focal points exacerbates this issue, hindering the integration of youth perspectives. Moreover, the scarcity of financial resources and the complexity of technical language used in UNCCD discussions further marginalises young voices.

The fragmented nature of engagement poses another challenge, with insufficient connections to UNCCD programs on all levels. Critically, there is currently no global process to enhance the capacity and representation of youth negotiators within UNCCD processes.

## United Nations OUR ference SOLUTION







The Youth Negotiators Academy (YNA) launched in 2022, with its first flagship initiative, the Climate Youth Negotiator Programme (CYNP). The program has witnessed significant growth and impact, becoming a vital platform fostering the development of young negotiators within the UNFCCC processes. Since its inception:

On 2022 it engaged **26** countries, equipping **60** young negotiators with essential skills. This cohort made substantial contributions, with 50 representatives actively participating in negotiations at COP27. Building on this momentum, the program expanded its reach in 2023, involving 54 countries and training 175 youth negotiators. Their amplified presence at COP28, with 125 negotiators present, underscored the program's efficacy in cultivating young climate negotiators.

The CYNP continues its efforts in 2024 and is guided by its mission to foster youth leadership, promote intergenerational and environmental justice, reinstall trust in democratic multilateral institutions, and ultimately contribute to better negotiated outcomes for both people and the planet.

A transformative approach for **Intergenerational Land Justice** and leadership in UN Land & Desertification Negotiations

- Countries sign the Memorandum of Understanding with LYNP
- Countries nominate up to 2 youth to participate in the LYNP according to the Selection Guide
- Participants benefit from a holistic, intensive six months programme to boost their capacity, confidence and connections to become young negotiators
- Young negotiators negotiate on behalf of their country at UNCCD COP16 in Riyadh, Kingdom of Saudi Arabia

### **SELECTION CRITERIA**

- Aged 18 35 years of age as of 2024
- Eligible: authorised and confirmed to negotiate in country's Party Delegation at COP16
- Able to participate fully in trainings ahead of COP16, starting in June 2024
- Able to attend and negotiate at COP16 in full
- Should have a good command of English both verbally and in writing.
- Should have a basic understanding of the UNCCD and LDN landscape (national and global context)
- Ability to represent the respective country (recognising the comprehensive support and guidance from the LYNP team).
- Willingness to engage with other young people and ensure that marginalised voices are heard in decision making.
- Confidence in the youth negotiator's leadership potential.

## HOW IT WORKS

At the 21 session of the Committee for the Review of the Implementation of the Convention (CRIC 21) to the UNCCD, YNA announced its second programme, the Land Youth Negotiator Programme (LYNP), intending to replicate the successful structure of CYNP within UNFCCC in the past 2 years.

## Empowering and equipping young people to become impactful and effective negotiators by

#### Driving systemic change to ensure longterm meaningful youth leadership by


- Providing funding for participation through dedicated travel and subsistence grants, recognizing the global financial inequalities and barriers;
- Gaining public support for the aimed impact through advocacy and outreach, recognizing and valuing the contributions of young negotiators in decision-making processes as essential for inclusive and effective governance





To take part, UNCCD member states sign an agreement with YNA to confirm that the young person is selected fairly according to the YNA selection guidelines and will have a meaningful, dedicated role as active negotiator in their country's delegation.

Young people can only be nominated by their UNCCD Country Focal Point, after signing the bespoken agreement.









## STRATEGIC ALIGNMENT


LYNP builds on the mandate and aim of the sole legally UNCCD as the binding international agreement linking environment development and to sustainable land management. The mandate of the Convention and its 197 Parties is to support a future that avoids, and reverses desertification/land degradation and minimizes effects of drought (DLDD) in affected areas at all levels – and to achieve Land Degradation Neutrality (LDN) consistent with the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.

During COP15 to the UNCCD in May 2022, a request was made to the UNCCD Secretariat, entailed the design of a Youth (YES) Engagement Strategy aimed developing a strategy and the necessary modalities for implementation. The objective is to ensure a more robust, effective, and meaningful involvement of youth in the meetings and processes of the Convention (as per decision 5/COP15). The goal is to integrate youth into UNCCD decision-making processes, acknowledging them as vital stakeholders in the UNCCD's work and empowering them to foster continual engagement opportunities.

# OBJECTIVES FOR 2024/25

## OVERALL PROGRAMMING

- Establish the LYNP and set up relevant partnerships
- Sign agreements with 30 Parties to train 60 youth negotiators, who will be supported to attend one or more of the UNCCD negotiations, including but not limited to UNCCD COP16 in 2024 and CRIC22 in 2025.

### CAPACITY BUILDING TRAINING

- Delivering a six month fundamental training on UNCCD Negotiations
- Create publicly accessible capacity-building content
- Mentorship Program: Pair young negotiators with experienced professionals in the field
- Conceptualising and delivering a pilot regional training.

## COMMUNITY BUILDING


- Fostering a community of negotiators and connecting it in the larger movement
- Create a wisdom council fostering intergenerational equity
- Collaborating with the CYNP by linking negotiators trained by both CYNP and LYNP for discussions on the synergies and outcomes between the UNCCD and UNFCCC negotiation processes.
- Setting up a learning companionship system between LYNP and CYNP.
- "In Conversation with..." sessions to strengthen thematic and practical experience sharing and to widen knowledge on intersectional topics.

### GRANTS

- Fundraise to provide Travel and Subsistence Grants to all negotiators from countries with insufficient financial resources for one or more UNCCD negotiations.
- In light of the growing momentum and interest in youth leadership and the urgency of the interlinked polycrisis, the LYNP is conceptualised as a multi-year programme.


